

Old-time band plays favorites

Past songs remain hits

Gladstonians can hear a local boy made good Saturday, Aug. 1, at the Chautauqua Festival.

Jack Quinby and His Old-Time Band will be playing a short concert from 2 to 2:20 p.m., then touring the park until 4:30 p.m. The group then takes the stage and plays until 4:50 p.m.

Quinby and his band are back for a return engagement following last year's successful festival debut.

The leader of the band graduated from Gladstone High School in 1975 and is the proprietor of Jack R. Quinby's Music Service, a booking and recording agency.

His six-piece band consists of himself on trombone, plus two clarinets, trumpet, tuba and drums.

"We've been playing together for seven years," Quinby said.

The group will play popular music from the early 1900s to the '50s, Quinby said.

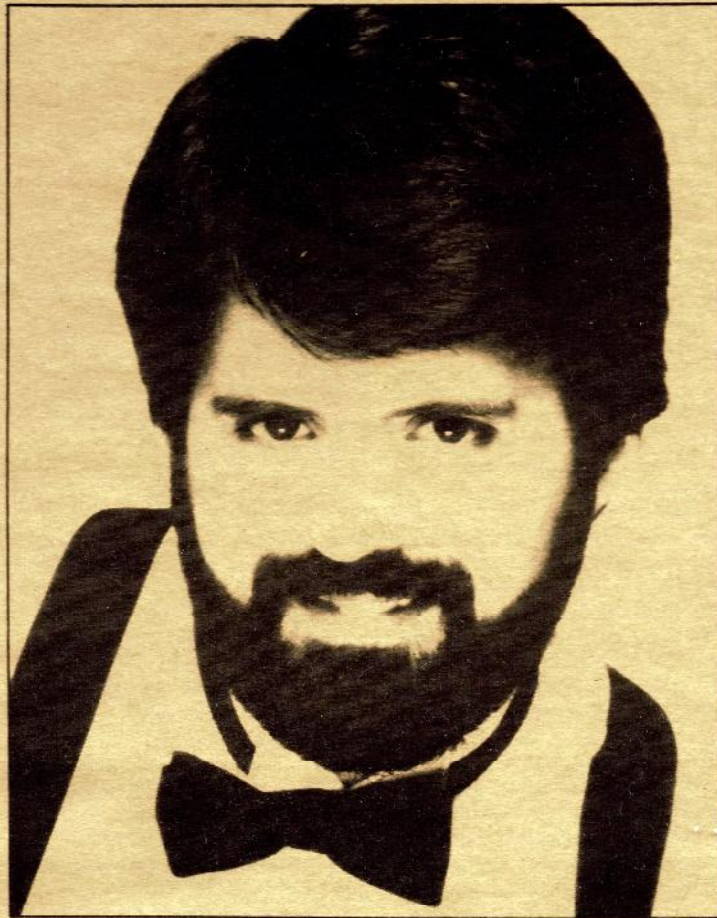
"Whatever was fun back then is fun now," he said.

That includes some big band sounds, polkas and marches. Also thrown in will be a little Dixieland and "a little bit of swing," Quinby said.

Another local face in His Old-Time Band is drummer Roger Allen of Milwaukie.

The ages of the performers range from 25 to 50, Quinby said.

Featured performer of the group is Quinby, who has worked as a band director and music teacher in schools. He has played in the orchestras for several Broadway pro-

He has toured the world, playing at such diverse music halls as Carnegie in New York, N.Y., Victoria in Geneva, Switzerland, and Royal

Albert in London, England.

In 1976 he performed in Philadelphia, Penn., for President Gerald Ford at the U.S. Bicentennial celebration.
